

College Facts Academic Year 2017-2018

MISSION	To provide quality learning opportunities to meet the social and economic needs of the community.		
HISTORY	 Founded in 1967 primarily to serve the residents of Lake County, Ohio. First college in Ohio founded by a vote of the people. Funded by Lake County tax levy in addition to state subsidy and student tuition and fees. 		
LOCATION	The main campus is on a 400-acre wooded site in Kirtland, at State Route 306 and Interstate 90, approximately 30 minutes from downtown Cleveland. Parking is free and well lit with patrolled lots located close to buildings. A satellite campus is located in Madison (Lakeland East). The Holden University Center, where our four-year partners hold classes, is across the street from the main campus.		
CALENDAR	Lakeland follows a semester academic calendar. Classes take place during fall and spring semesters and three summer sessions. The academic year begins in the summer and runs through the spring semester.		
ACCREDITATION	 Lakeland Community College is accredited by the Higher Learning Commission and maintains its accreditation following the Academic Quality Improvement Program (AQIP) pathway. Specific program accreditations are listed in the college's printed catalog and schedules (see http://www.lakelandcc.edu/web/about/degrees-certificates-academics/). 		
EMPLOYEES/ FACULTY	 Lakeland employs approximately 893 faculty and staff on an annual basis. This includes 119 Full-Time Faculty and 381 Part-Time Faculty. (HEI AM Report, Fall 2017) The student/faculty ratio is 16 to 1. (HEI CN Report, Fall 2017) 		
GRADUATES	 966 associate degrees were awarded at Lakeland in the 2017-2018 academic year and an additional 536 certificates were awarded. (2017-2018 Graduate Profile Report) 55% of associate degree graduates earned an Associate of Arts or Associate of Science degree. 45% earned an associate degree in a technical area (Associate of Applied Science, Applied Business, or Technical Studies). (2017-18 Graduate Profile Report) 96.8% of graduates surveyed are satisfied to very satisfied with the quality of their educational experience at Lakeland. (Graduate Exit Survey 2017-18) 56.2% of graduates plan to enroll at a four-year college or university within the next year. Most intend to enroll in a program that is related to or a continuation of the program they completed at Lakeland. (77.6%) (Graduate Exit Survey 2017-18) 		
CONTINUING EDUCATION	 Lakeland's annual non-credit unduplicated headcount is approximately 1,724 students with a total course registration count of 2,360. (2017-18 academic year) Continuing Education conducted 625 noncredit course sections during the 2017-18 academic year. 		
LAKELAND FOUNDATION	 Established in 1982 as a non-profit 501(c)(3) organization to enhance educational opportunities for students at Lakeland Community College. A board of 40 volunteer leaders from the community governs the Foundation. There are over 250 different scholarship, program, and endowment funds currently in place, along with general assistance for student technology needs, faculty innovation in teaching projects, and other emerging needs. "Futures Rising" demonstrates the Foundation's commitment to provide opportunities that empower student success and enrich the quality of life of our community. (Foundation Annual Report)

ACADEMIC PROGRAMS

- Lakeland offers 134 programs (60 associate degrees and 74 certificates) and nearly 1,000 different courses in the following academic subdivisions: Arts & Humanities; Computer, Design and Engineering Technologies; Education, Human and Public Services; Health Technologies; Languages and Communications; Management; Sciences and Mathematics; and Social Sciences.
- The average time to complete an associate degree for non-transfer students at Lakeland is 4.0 years. (OBR Completion Report, Associate degree earners in 2014-2015)
- Bachelor's & Master's degree completion programs are offered at Lakeland's Holden
 University Center in partnership with Cleveland State University, Franklin University, Hiram
 College, John Carroll University, Kent State University, Lake Erie College, Notre Dame
 College, The University of Akron, Ursuline College, and Youngstown State University.


REPORTS

- Enrollment headcount: 7,571 in Fall 2017 and 6,714 in Spring 2018.
- Credit hours: 63,883 in Fall 2017 and 55,004 in Spring 2018.
- Full-time Equivalent Students (FTE): 4,259 in Fall 2017 and 3,667 in Spring 2018.
- 10,742 students take courses for credit annually. (HEI Unduplicated headcount for FY 2017)
- 39% of students are taking at least one class online. Distance learning accounts for 21.9% of the total credit hours. (*Fall 2017*)
- Average age of Lakeland students is 25. 65.1% of the student body is under 25 years of age. (Fall 2017)
- 58.4% of students are female, 41.6% are male. (Fall 2017)
- 64.1% are from Lake County, 18.4% from Cuyahoga, 10.9% from Geauga, 4.4% from Ashtabula, 2.1% from other counties or out of state. (Fall 2017)
- Minorities: 20.8% (13.3% African-American, 3.4% Hispanic, 1.4% Asian, and 0.3% American Indian, 2.3% two or more races, non-resident alien .1%). (*Fall 2017*)
- 71.1% of students are part-time (fewer than 12 credit hours per term). (Fall 2017)
- 27.7% of students are new, 60.2% continuing, and 12.1% returning. (Fall 2017)
- 36.5% of Lakeland students receive some form of financial aid. (Fall 2017)
- Of students who reported employment status, 63.5% are employed full or part-time and 36.5% are not employed. (Census Day SPSS file, Fall 2017)
- 1,508 students are participating in the College Credit Plus program. 19.9% of Fall enrollment. (Fall 2017)




Student County of Residence:



Student Gender:


